




- Starting in FY12, reports began to shift from mainly penetrative offenses to non-penetrative sexual contact.
- Service Members continue to recognize and report non-penetrative offenses as sexual assault.

ARMY ACTIVE /USAR REPORTING


Sexual assault reporting increased steadily from FY12 to FY14, decreased slightly in FY15 and 16, and then increased in FY17.

- FY17 reporting rates are at highest levels for both male and female Soldiers.



All Victims


(Includes all reports of sexual assault in which either the subject or the victim is a Service Member (SM); excluding spouse/intimate partner and juvenile cases.)




Army Active/USAR Sexual Harassment

- The number of informal complaints that required investigation dropped sharply in FY16, indicating that commanders and SHARP professionals have been doing their due diligence to comply with DoD Policy in the absence of updated Army policy.
- The update to AR 600-20 will provide clarifying guidance that will enable consistent response and reporting.
